Even though it is just a few years old, the comic strip (连环漫画),Cul de Sac, has already won many fans through its characters. So when cartoonist, Richard Thompson, announced that he had been diagnosed with

Parkinson's disease (帕金森氏症), his fans sat up and took notice.

One of the fans was Chris Sparks, a designer and web developer in North Carolina. Sparks was building a website for Thompson when the cartoonist announced his disease. He started reading more about Parkinson's disease through books and websites. There he found that people could form public fund-raising teams to raise money for Parkinson's research. He quickly decided to form his own team: Team Cui de Sac.

However, Sparks decided to take a different path. He has contacted dozens of cartoonists around the world, who will contribute artworks inspired by the Cui de Sac strip. Thompson's publisher, Andrews Mcmeel, has agreed to release them in a book next year. Some of the profits from the book will go to the research. And after the book is released, the artworks will be auctioned (拍卖)。比 All profits will go to the research team. The aim is to raise \$450,000 for the foundation. "We've already had around 80 people who say they are interested in contributing", says Sparks.

Although many people with Parkinson's disease are private about their condition, Thompson is not one of them. He's happy to put his support behind the project "I think we can make a difference, says Sparks, who points out that his love of comics inspired him. I've been reading comics since I was 5 years old, and most of the cartoonists I've met have been wonderful human beings," he says. "They've made a difference in my life, and I hope to make a difference as well."

When you take to the seas on a cruise (游船度假), you usually think you are leaving solid ground behind, but the Celebrity Solstice brings a whole new experience to its passengers. Aboard the 317m-long ship is a half-acre lawn (草坪). The Celebrity Solstice is the first cruise ship ever to house live grass.

Nikolas Asproudas, the ship, environmental officer told *New Zealand News*, "It was a crazy idea to start with. For five years now, they have been saying that this lawn is the most walked lawn in the world. It's a symbol of honor, particularly because the lawn on

the top deck of the ship has special challenges with growth at sea, including "bums" from the salt water, which must be washed off immediately and clearance checks before the ship can pull in to shore.

The lawn is grown in silica (二氧化硅) sand rather than soil, which not only reduces weight, helping the ship's stability, but also agrees with restrictions and helps control pests that may otherwise stay on the grass.

Asproudas sends the Captain of the ship a weekly report on the. status of the lawn. "We know that the Australian and New Zealand authorities .are very strict with the grass, and of course, they have to check before we come if everything's OK," said the Captain..

The lawn is a source of pride for Asproudas, so when there are problems with it, he says, "It brings me some sad *feelings*, but I need to be strong, because I know that it will, recover within one week" All of the crew's hard work to maintain the "backyard" is appreciated by its many, guests, including some: that say the Celebrity Solstice's lawn is better than theirs at home. Two recent passengers aboard said, "We're having a drought at home so...it was brilliant!"

Though the option of walking barefoot through a grassy field on a moving cruise ship seems terrific, there are many other ships that are trying to outdo one another with even more surprising guest options.

Earthworms don't move fast. But humans can accelerate the worms' spread. Fishermen often use invasive (蔓延性的) earthworms to catch fish. Many have introduced invasive earthworms to rivers, streams and lakes previously unexposed to these animals. Gardener who use earthworms to make their soil rich may unknowingly introduce invasive ones. The worms even give rides in the mud on wheels, potted plants and road materials shipped

around the nation.

But they're not everywhere yet. In the Great Lakes region, "20 percent of the land is earthworm-free," says Cindy Hale, a research biologist. Of the remaining 80 percent of land half of the land has fewer than two earthworm species — meaning there isn't yet too much impact on the ecosystem, she explains. For these regions, she says, now is the time to take action. According to Hale, educating the public, especially fishermen, is one approach to stopping the spread of invasive earthworms. Identifying which lands are currently earthworm-free is another.

Ryan Hueffmeier, a program coordinator for Great Lakes Worm Watch, has been working on a model that will help create large maps of areas with minimal (最小的) or no damage from earthworms. Ultimately, landowners can use it to identify earthworm activity on their property. Once identified, lands with minimal or no earthworm damage should be protected.

But scientists suspect that once invasive earthworms arrive they can't be removed And even if all could be, affected forests might never return to the way they were. "It's very much a story of learning to live with them,"

concludes Lee Frelich of the University of Minnesota's Center for Forest Ecology.

Forest ecologists have called earthworms "ecosystem engineers" because they can change or create habitats that otherwise would not be present. Whether this is a good thing depends on the situation.

"What the earthworms do and how we value it is what really matters." said Hale. "In one place — farm fields or gardens - we really like European earthworms and what they do, so we consider them *good*. In native hardwood forests, we really don't like what they do - so we consider them bad. You really have to understand how an organism (微生物) affects an ecosystem. Things aren't black and white."

When the moon passes between the Sun and the Earthy the resulting view of the Sun is called a solar eclipse  $(\exists \ \ \ \ \ \ )$ . Solar eclipses are beautiful astronomical events and many people across the world travel to faraway places to get a clear view of the phenomenon. 31 Others choose special eyewear.

It is believed that a pregnant woman with a baby should not view a solar eclipse. They are often told that their child will be badly formed if they view a solar eclipse. However, various scientific authorities have stated over and over again that there is no harm at all in viewing a solar eclipse with the right eye gear. 32 \_\_.

It is important, however, that you view a solar eclipse with the right eye gear. Staring right at the sun could permanently damage the eyes. It is wrong to assume that the sun can be looked at after the moon blocks out a majority of it. 33 .

If you want to view the eclipse, you have to get special glasses. As opposed to popular belief sunglasses and dark films do NOT protect our eyes. 34 You can do this by fixing a telescope and focusing the image onto a sheet of paper. You can clearly see the eclipse on the sheet of paper. You should never look directly at the eclipse through the telescope.

Similarly, you can make a tiny hole on an opaque (不透明的) sheet of paper and *let* the light passing through fall on a sheet of paper. <u>35</u> Alternatively, you can watch it live on TV which is the safest way of viewing a solar

eclipse!
