




The willow branches are swaying gracefully in the wind.



The warm and gentle spring breeze is stroking the lake and the gleaming ripples are charming.












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The Warmer Days of Spring

Soon they will feed **wiggly** worms to hungry babies.




The Woods

The trees are growing again.


The fat **buds** on a tree grow into big, flat leaves.

She is hungry.




The Meadow
