



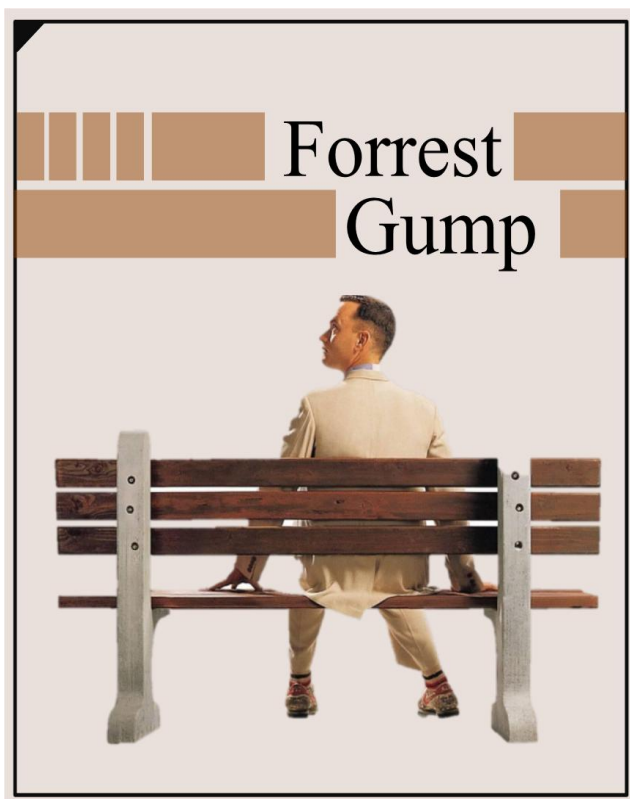

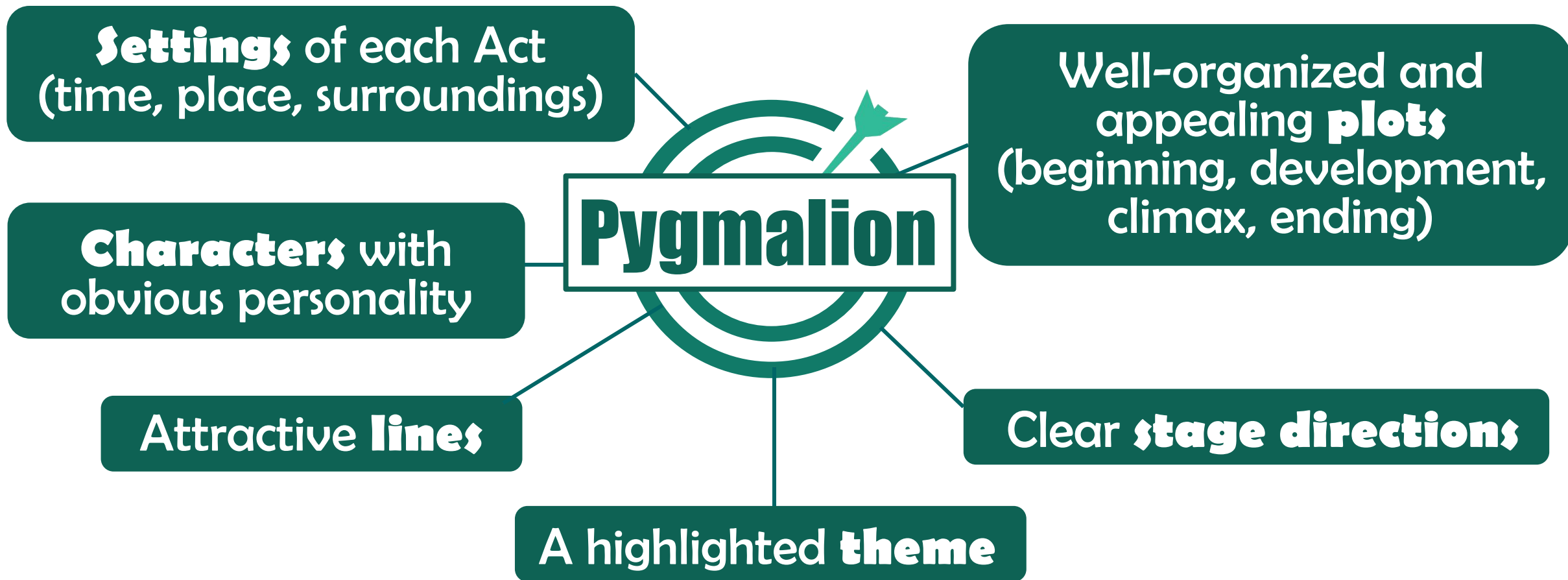

● Life is like a box of chocolates. You never know what you're gonna get.

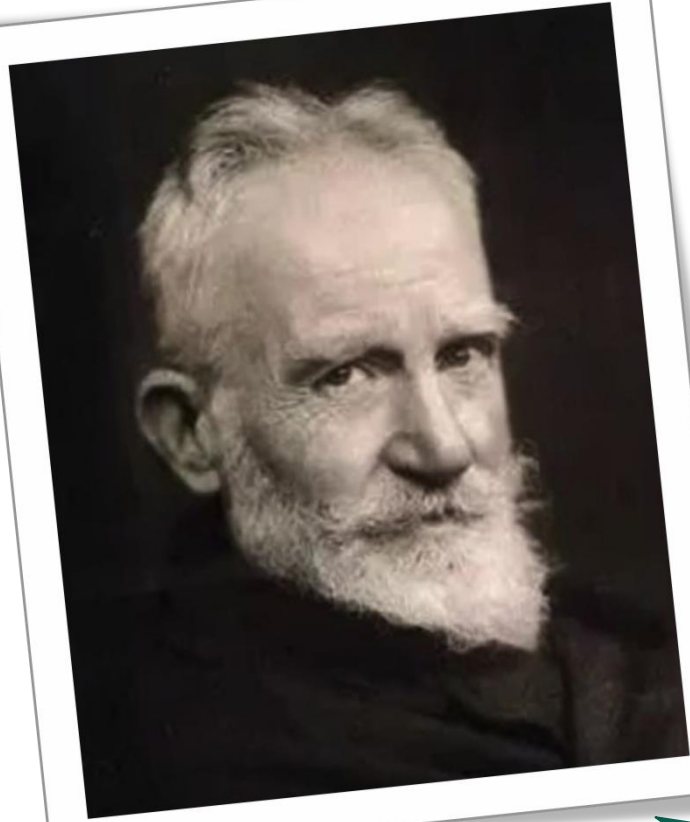

About the author



George Bernard Shaw
(1856-1950)

- An Irish dramatist, a literary critic, socialist spokesman, and humorous playwright.
- A defender of women's rights, and advocate of equality of income.
- In 1925 he was awarded the Nobel Prize for Literature. He accepted the honor but refused the money.

"You're so skinny. When people see you, they will know how poor your country is."

"You're a meat ball. When people see you, they will know the reason why our country is so poor."



Characters

Social status & personality

Eliza Doolittle (E): a poor flower girl who is **ambitious** to improve herself.

Professor Higgins (H): an expert in **phonetics**, **convinced** that the quality of a person's English decides his/ her position in society

Colonel Pickering (CP): an official in **the army** and later **a friend of Higgins** who sets him a task

Tip 1 : Characters with different social status and personality help create conflict and make the plot more appealing.

Tip 2 : The setting of an Act is intended to help the audience picture a particular place or type of surroundings where the Act takes place.

Tip 3 : Stage directions are instructions in a play to indicate the movements, positions or tones of an actor/actress, or the sound effects and lighting, which help us to understand the lines and the plot better.

goes out

- **What does Higgins think of the newly rich?**

They become **wealthy financially**, but their pronunciation still remains poor, which to some degree reveals their **original lower social status**.

- **What is Higgins' plan to transform Eliza?**

Higgins will **educate Eliza to speak properly** so that she can pass herself off in three months as **a duchess** at an ambassador's garden party, and perhaps work as **a lady's maid** or **a shop assistant**.

- **What are Higgins' attitudes towards Eliza and Pickering?**
Can you find out the evidence from the play?

The social status of each character influences the way they behave to each other. Generally speaking, people are more polite to those who they think are of a higher social class and less polite to those they consider are members of a lower class.

Tip 4 : The attraction of the plot lies in presenting vivid emotions and actions, creating conflict between characters, and reflecting a certain phenomenon that can strike a chord (引起共鸣) with the audience.

George Bernard Shaw's version

Higgins is **extremely strict** with Eliza in educating her to speak properly. In the process, a great many **conflicts** and **funny things** come about. Through their persistent efforts, Eliza eventually **performs perfectly** in a reception dinner hosted by a Greek ambassador and **successfully integrates herself into the upper class**. Meanwhile, Higgins develops a **deep affection** for Eliza.



Theme

● Why did George Bernard Shaw **title** this play “**Pygmalion**”?



Pygmalion, a gifted artist, makes a **stone statue** of a beautiful woman.

He asks the Greek Goddess to **bring her to life**.

Finally, **his wish is granted**.
